Parents Hear Explosion Just

LEVELLAND, July 8.—Two infants, trapped in a flame-enveloped house, perished today and their father received serious burns in a frantic attempt to save their lives.

The children, Geraldine, nine months, and Norma Ruth, four years, only children of Mr. and Mrs. Berry Lyons, young farm couple residing near Whiteface, were trapped in their beds when an explosion rocked the structure.

Parents Hear Blast

Their father, milking a cow a short distance away, had called to his wife to bring him a pan of hot water to wash the separator. She took him the water and seconds later they heard an explosion and saw flames shoot through the house.

Berry rushed into the flames and brought out Geraldine. He was seared on the face and arms. Neighbors grabbed him as he frantically sought to rescue his other daughter.

Thinks Stove Exploded

Norma Ruth's charred remains were raked from the house after the walls had collapsed. The youngest daughter died in a physician's office after being rushed here.

It was believed the oil stove on which Mrs. Berry was cooking breakfast exploded.
